<u>Update from Police – Allegations Against People in Positions of Trust</u>



When an allegation of assault is made against a member of staff within a school, this must be brought to the attention of MASH Police, usually from the LADO contacting the MASH police directly. It is important police have the information as soon as possible, so they can create a Child Concern Notification (CCN). MASH police then notify the police

Child Protection Team who will investigate.

It is not the decision of schools whether allegations should be reported to the police, and it is not a decision of the LADO to determine if an offence has been committed, this is the role of the police. There have been incidents where schools have completed an internal investigation prior to police being informed and this can affect the outcome of the police investigation. Police should be the lead agency and investigate criminal matters first.

Also, reports of allegations should be made to police before the LADO meeting and not during the meeting. This will allow the investigation team to be aware of the allegations and attend the LADO meeting with that information, where they will be able to share what stage, the investigation is at with those involved in the meeting.

Operation Encompass – EOTAS



If your school receives an Operation Encompass notification for a child on your roll, but who is working with EOTAS, please inform the EOTAS team as soon as possible. The sooner this information is passed on to the EOTAS staff, the sooner the child can be given the appropriate support.

Meeting Digital and Technology Standards in Schools and Colleges



The Department for Education has created filtering and monitoring standards for schools and colleges in England to help protect children online. The standards cover:

- Areas of responsibility
- Testing device efficiency
- Creating strategies that meet safeguarding needs

The standards were published on 23rd March 2022 and were updated on 23rd March 2023, and can be accessed here.

Please note; Northumberland Children and Adults' Safeguarding Partnership (NCASP) have stated that all DSLs working in Northumberland schools need to do their refresher training, every 2 years with the Northumberland Schools Safeguarding Team, regardless of where schools commission their safeguarding support. DSLs who are new to the authority and have not previously trained with the Schools Safeguarding Team, also need to complete the Northumberland Referral Process Training. Training dates for these training sessions are as shown below:

Young Carers Identification and Awareness Session

This workshop will focus on how to recognise and support young carers and consider the impact this role may be having on their wellbeing and development. The session will cover the role Carers Northumberland has in supporting young carers and the key part professionals play in the identification and signposting of young carers.

The training will cover topics such as:

- How to identify young carers
- Signs
- Strategies of how to approach the topic with young carers and their families
- Assessment
- How to refer a young carer for further support

The training can be delivered remotely or face to face. A session is held monthly via teams on the <u>Learning</u> <u>Together portal</u>

Prevent

Martvn's Law

Following the Government's consultation on updates to the Protect Duty, which is part of the Prevent Duty, there is a plan to update guidance to schools and colleges in relation to security guidance for publicly accessible locations (PALs). The following summary from the interim guidance identifies some of the key points that will shortly be made available to schools.

Why do I need to consider counter-terrorism? The terrorist threat to education settings is currently assessed as low. Martyn's Law legislation will improve the security awareness and preparedness of a range of locations to protect against and mitigate the impact of attacks. Improving CT security awareness and preparedness mitigates against a range of risks – not just from terrorism. As Protect Duty policy develops, and as and when legislation is agreed by Parliament, tailored guidance will support the education sector to meet its obligations under the Protect Duty.

What resources can I access now? All schools will have policies, plans and procedures in place to deal effectively with health and safety responsibilities. Processes to identify, assess, and review health and safety risks can be adapted to address security matters. Guidance, training and advice on safety and security can be found here:

- <u>ProtectUK</u> is a new counter terrorism Policing platform to help organisations counter terrorism, increase awareness and stay alert. The ProtectUK app offers actionable content that can help counter-terrorism. The app also includes videos, such as 'RUN HIDE TELL' showing clear steps to take if faced with a terrorist incident.
- <u>Centre for the Protection of National Infrastructure | CPNI</u> As the UK Government's national technical authority for physical and personnel protective security, the CPNI website covers a range of advice and guidance that is free to access.
- <u>School and college security GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</u> is non-statutory guidance to help schools and colleges develop policies and plans to manage and respond to security related incidents. The local context is crucial when developing your policies. This should reflect your school or college's unique circumstances, including size and location, character and ethos, educational needs, and local priorities.

We are in regular contact with our colleagues in the counter terrorism team and will update you as the guidance develops and is made available for educational settings.

Online Reporting Hub



When it comes to online reporting, it can be difficult to understand what processes are involved when we need to escalate certain types of content, particularly for children and young people. The SWGfl reporting hub can help with this.

The reporting hub is broken down in several ways. It gives an overview of what harmful online content can look like, when it needs to be reported, and why it is important to report, and where to go to escalate concerns.

NHS Resource - Be Body Positive



Resource to support parents, carers and professionals to help children and young people to:

- Improve eating behaviours and relationship with food
- Build positive body image
- Identify concerns around body image and disordered eating

The site also has educational modules for use with children and young people, which explore the following topics:

Body image and Normal Eating -

- Intuitive and balanced eating
- Feeling comfortable in your body
- · Breaking free from diet culture

Avoidant Restrictive Food Intake Disorder (ARFID) -

- Managing anxiety around food
- Understanding hunger
- Support a young person with ARFID as well as very picky or fussy eaters

What is disordered eating? -

- Understanding disordered eating
- Recognising the signs and signals
- Supporting emotional regulation

Bullies Out – E-Safety Resource



Advice for parents and carers on how to keep their children safe online and to have conversations with their children around online safety, bullying, upward bullying and how to be kind online.

There is also information on the site for school staff on how to deal with harassment and bullying that they may experience in the workplace.

Northumbria Police Prevention Through Education Team



When children and young people are not aware of the risks of exploitation, they can unwittingly share, or be coerced into sharing personal information and images that make the grooming process that much easier for someone attempting to exploit them. In the wake of Child Exploitation Awareness Day, the Prevention Through Education

Team would like to highlight some resources that they've created and made available online to help educate children, parents and carers:

- Year 5 and 6 <u>Internet Safety lesson</u> talks through what is and isn't safe to share and makes young people think about who they talk to online.
- Reducing children's exposure to violent and pornographic content contains advice on parental

controls for devices and how to talk to young children about keeping safe online.

- Year 7 onwards, a short video called Megan's Story is available: Megan gives an account of her nude image being leaked and the devastating effect it had on her. This resource can be used as a conversation starter in class, or shared with parents and carers for their awareness, alongside the following guide:
- A guide for parents and carers Sharing nudes raises awareness, contains tips on how to keep children and young people safer online, and signposts to further support.

Schools may also wish to consider hosting the Violence Reduction Unit's (VRU) Education Team . The team offers an hour-long, classroom based malicious communications session for Key Stage 3 and 4 students. As well as encouraging children to consider the impact and consequences of sending unkind, inappropriate or offensive messages, the topic of sharing nudes is addressed. Catch On - Child Exploitation Resource Pack

Northumbria Police Prevention Through Education Team have informed us of the **Catch-On Education Resource about Child Exploitation aimed at pupils in Years 7 and 8.** The resource contains a suite of options for a single lesson or series of lessons exploring the topic of grooming and exploitation. Materials include lesson slides with embedded links and videos: comprehensive lesson plan guidance with photocopiable activity sheets; a handbook for parents and professionals.

The resource has been written by a team of frontline practitioners and curriculum leads from one of the Catch 22 Schools. The aim is to make children aware of child exploitation, empower them to recognise the warning signs, and know where to go to get help if they or their friends are targeted.
