Keeping Children Safe in Education (KCSiE) September 2016

The government have updated KCSiE. The most recent version will become statutory from 5th September 2016 and you can view and download your new copy <u>here</u>.

The guidance has been updated to reflect changes in legislation which have occurred during the last academic year, for example the introduction of mandatory reporting where female genital mutilation is suspected and the Prevent duty. There is also clarification in areas where it was felt a greater focus was needed in school, for example the importance of early intervention, strengthening the role of the designated safeguarding lead and training requirements.

From the start of the new academic year in September 2016 governing bodies have a duty to ensure that all staff have read at least part 1 and have access to a copy of the guidance.

To support schools an updated model Child Protection Policy will be available by 1st September 2016 on the LSCB webpages. There will also be an updated training pathway, endorsed by the LSCB, with the minimum requirements for DSLs, governors and other staff clearly identified.

PSHE Curriculum Resources

Two different sets of resources which can be used to supplement your existing PSHE curriculum.

- Northumbria Police would like to draw your attention to a new resource that Childnet have just launched. Trust Me is a free online resource designed to support primary and secondary school teachers in exploring critical thinking. The resource includes lesson plans, presentations and worksheets. Personal safety, whether it is in the physical or digital realm, has always depended on equipping young people with the skills to protect themselves and helping them to develop critical thinking skills must be a key aspect of this. - 2. Alright Charlie is resource is designed for use with children aged 9-11 in primary schools and aims to highlight, in an age appropriate way, the warning signs of grooming. The film is seen through the eyes of Charlie who is groomed by Danny. The resource was designed in consultation with CSE professionals, primary school teachers and children in years 5 and 6. Poster Campaign

With the permission of Plymouth LSCB a series of posters have been developed to help raise awareness of the key messages and learning from Serious Case Reviews. They are aimed at all staff working with children, young people, adults and families and can be used in schools and other education settings. A **Briefing in a Minute** on Private Fostering is available for staff and partner agencies. The briefing is part of a series of Briefings in a Minute which aim to ensure that information is accessible and is captured in a short and easy to read format. Updated Neglect Strategy

Northumberland Safeguarding Children Board has launched a new strategy focused on how to deal with children suffering from neglect. In the last 18 months there has been a 21% increase in cases relating to neglect. In 2014 a total of 48% cases had Child Protection plans relating to neglect, which had risen to 56% in 2015 and 69% this year.

Our local <u>Neglect Strategy</u> sets out in more details how safeguarding teams will intervene at the earliest opportunity and avoid where appropriate statutory referrals to social work services.

Pass It On Campaign

This campaign is encouraging people across Northumberland to act if they think a child is suffering. The campaign is the brainchild of four young people working in partnership with Northumberland Youth Service to design posters and business cards to circulate amongst young people and adults who work with young people to raise awareness of safeguarding. The aim of the business cards is to 'pass it on' so young people can take ten cards, keep one for themselves and then pass the remaining cards to their friends.
